Reflecting on the Year:

Since Bernie and I traded jobs last summer, we have continued to work together to lead the ROCA Board and members. We continue to seek a VP, but the collaboration of the executive on the Board has been fulfilling and effective. I want to thank Bernie for his concert production leadership, and Victor in particular, for working so closely with Vincent on everything financial- we now have a credit card and pay all our staff electronically. We are 'in the black' and continue to spend frugally on things we feel are most important. This year, we will spend a portion of the budget on recordings again- we would love to find a donor for this type of project. **Do you know of a sponsor or community partner you'd like to connect us with?**

We have recently applied for the Richmond Community Foundation grant and continue to maintain our connection with the RCF. We are applying this week for the City of Richmond Arts and Culture grant as well. This last year was a BUSY one, full of decisions about health and safety as well as about how to extend our reach and support to the community this was documented in our grant applications.

Last year, we began our collaboration with West Coast Recordings and started to look at our online ticket sales/donations platform in new ways. Our office administrator, Vincent Ho took on more organizational work and met with me each month to determine all the tasks the ROCA office needed to manage in a given year. Brigid again created zoom lessons for the singers when we weren't able to be together due to Covid-19, and James curated young talent to showcase at the Rising Stars concert.

We raised over \$4000 for the Ukrainian Community Society of Ivan Franko, and we took time to perform and participate in our community with events like the Food Bank



concert, an elementary school pop up concert, and caroling at Winter Wonderland. With huge kudos to Vincent and the Board, we were able to create beautiful moments ranging from our Christmas concert music being shared in

Christmas concert music being shared in care homes, to selling tickets and bringing in new donors and community partners-even during a pandemic! This summer, the chorus performed at a wedding (mine!) and added another experience to the year. We do weddings! Tell your friends!



We have had a great start to the 2022-2023 season with rehearsals throughout September and a couple of events Richmond's "Culture Days"! Thank you to the singers who came to "Moth-Like Silvery Blue"—a true performance art experience at sunset- wow! And, thank you very much to



Membership





This is likely due to the still lingering effects of the pandemic and changes we have all made to our lifestyles. Donations


Last year we were able to raise \$262.00 for the Richmond Foodbank and an astounding \$4000.00 for the Ukrainian Community Society of Ivan Franko. Tickets




The total amount of tickets sold for our live in-person concerts were 278. But please note that Canadian Voices was a friends and family event so no tickets were sold for that performance. Overall the actual number of attendees should be higher.



For the online concerts, the total amount of tickets sold was 210, with Christmas Traditions being the most popular. The total tickets sold altogether are 488.





The total amount of views on our online videos comes in at a total of 2128 views. Christmas Traditions is again the most popular, accounting for almost half of all online views.

It is important to point out that the new online concert recordings option accounts for around 43% of the total number of tickets sold. Those who purchased the video recordings are watching them about 10 times each; however we cannot tell if they are watching it many times by themselves or being shared with family and friends. It's probably a combination of both. Most likely the pandemic is partially responsible for some of the online concert recording ticket purchases, but it certainly does show an interest from people that like to watch our concerts from the comfort of their own home.

Conclusion

The 2021-2022 season was marked by many changes. We were able to return to in person concerts after several years of strict pandemic restrictions, Education School Concerts also resumed, and we added a new online concert recordings option. Now that we are slowly returning to some semblance of normality in our daily lives, I am looking forward to what the new 2022-2023 season will bring.

Chorus Conductor's Report to AGM 2022

Our 2021-2022 Season was a welcome improvement on the one before, though still not back to "normal" after the long battle with COVID. We are now embarking on a new season in which we hope that, with caution, we can return to something closer to our usual mode.

Season '21-'22 was pretty hybrid. It was SO good to be able to sing together – but the things that made it possible, also made it frustrating. My deep gratitude to all on the Safety Committee who kept us focused on looking out for each other as we embarked on a new season of rehearsals.

We were fortunate enough to be working in Fraserview Sanctuary, where it is possible to give people good spacing, and to have lots of room around us. Although it's an old ventilation system, and probably without a good air-exchange rate, it has been a big improvement on singing in the Fireside Room with its low ceiling. Initially, we kept rehearsals shorter and made sure that we had good break-time outside. Singers were careful about masking and distancing, and if concerned, joined us by Zoom. Zoom rehearsals, however, are not satisfactory either for the Zoomers, or for the remaining choir, who miss their singing cohorts.

Our accompanist for the season was Jeremiah Chua, accompanying at this level for the first time, and learning the basic skills needed. We thank him for his time with us.

It was a two-concert season, and one that evolved rather than was planned, since we had no idea how things might develop. We established early that Orchestra and Chorus would work separately, and that we would not try to cram everyone onto a stage. In the early fall we established some repertoire that I thought we would use in the spring, and then we focused on music for a Christmas concert, based around Christmas traditions. I think everyone was pleasantly surprised by the sound-quality of the concert recording by Chris Haas, despite wearing masks, and we heard from both in-person audience members, and those receiving the recorded version about their pleasure in what they heard.

Things closed down for a while after Christmas as COVID numbers surged again, but we returned to the online meeting pattern of the season before, and did not feel that our time was entirely wasted. When we returned to in-person rehearsals at the end of February, it was to focus on preparation for a concert program of Canadian singer-songwriters, which gave us all both a challenge and much joy. We took an early end to the season, and a subset of the Chorus spent time in preparing music for Laura's wedding – singing outside, maskless, was a great pleasure!

It was a limited season, but not a wasted one – full of good music and keeping us together as a musical family. Though many Chorus members have had COVID, there has been no breakout through Chorus rehearsals, and I thank all who have been so careful to observe all the protocols that help keep us safe.

My gratitude goes to everyone who has borne with us for a sometimes challenging, but musically satisfying, season, and who have held together and cared for each other. It has been sad not to work with James and the Orchestra, but we look forward to performing together again in the upcoming season. My thanks to the members of the Board for their constant support, and especially to President Laura and Vice/Past-President Bernie – it has been a joy and a privilege to work with you all. Making music together is one of the most important things we can do.

Report to AGM: October 15th, 2022

This past year has been one of incredible challenges both globally and personally. However through all of this there has remained one constant and that is the great friendship and support from all the members of ROCA.

In the 2021/2022 season the orchestra was able to perform two concerts. In the first I had the the distinct pleasure of performing the Bruch Violin Concerto. It had been my pandemic project to learn the concerto so it was an immense thrill to not only be able to rehearse it extensively with the orchestra but also to perform and record.

In the spring we were also able to continue our long standing tradition of featuring young soloist at our Rising Stars Concerts. This was a particular treat as it featured the less common solo instruments the flute and a french horn.

The 2022/2023 season is off to a great start with a full return to rehearsals and concerts. This season will feature our In Memoriam Concert with the first combined orchestra and chorus performance in several years, Christmas Mall and Food Bank concerts, Rising Stars, Libby Yu and a Grand Finale of favourites from the past decades!

I would like to thank the board of directors and all the members of ROCA for your continued support during the past year. It is very heartwarming to know that there is such a caring group of people that not only love great music but also know how important the people are in our organization. We have made a strong return to in person rehearsals and concerts and I am optimistic this is the beginning of a renewed dedication to music and the performing arts.

Annual General Meeting October 18, 2022

Highlights

We were able to finish our financial year with a **Net Income (or profit) of 13,894** thanks to a Revenue increase of 23% compared to the previous year.

A welcome change in how we process recurring monthly payments: we make direct deposits whenever possible. We used to issue cheques which needed 2 signatories who had to drive to the office every time. Furthermore, we are now able to receive membership dues by etransfers.

Revenue

We were lucky to receive the highest Endowment Fund Distribution ever: 8,899 or 35% more than in the previous year.

We achieved ticket sales of 8,591 compared with zero in the previous year when we did not have concerts at all due to COVID restrictions.

Expenses

We spent 3,100 for the choir's accompanist in the reporting year. Zoom meetings in the previous year did not require an accompanist (as a coincidence Toby had retired).

We are finally back in the business of performing: to produce four concerts, we spent 10,675 (other production costs). The rehearsal and concert venues cost us 5,400.

Budget 2022-23

We are projecting a balanced budget for the current financial year.

On the **Revenue** side we are expecting a lower endowment fund distribution by 9,720, or -28% due to unfavorable markets.

We applied for a grant of 7,200 from the Richmond Community Foundation to cover the cost of the recording of our six concerts this year.

On the **Expenses** side we are expecting very similar figures like in the past year.
